already

It's used in affirmative sentences. It's placed between the auxiliary verb and the past participle.-> Homework is finished. I've aiready done it.

yet

It's used in negative and interrogative sentences. It's placed at the end of the sentence. -> Have you finished your task yet? Not yet, sorry.

just

It's used in affirmative sentences. It's placed between the auxiliary verb and the past participle. -> Look, he has just arrived. It was five minutes ago.

Still

It's used in negative sentences. It's placed before the auxiliary verb with the Present Perfect. -> She still hasn't seen it.

ever

It's mostly used in questions. It's placed between the auxiliary verb and the past participle. ->

Have you ever eaten snails?

never

It's used in affirmative sentences — it makes the sentence negative. It's placed between the auxiliary verb and the past participle. -> I've never eaten snails before.

for

It indicates a period of time.
-> I haven't seen him for a year.

since

It indicates a specific point in time.

-> I haven't seen him since Christmas.

lately / so far

- -> He has bought his Car lately. (= recently)
- -> I've done three exercises so far. (= until now/ up to now)
